

NHIP BRIEF REPORT:

**Domestic Violence Beds within Continuum Housing Inventory Charts
Time Period: 2015**

Overview:

Persons fleeing domestic violence are an important subpopulation served by the homeless service systems. Under the federal definition of homelessness, persons staying in either emergency or transitional Domestic Violence (DV) shelters are considered homeless. These facilities are generally listed on Housing Inventory Chart (HIC) for each Continuum and are considered part of the array of housing serving homeless persons. Persons residing in these beds are also often counted as homeless when Point-in-Count studies are completed. The extent to which all DV beds are listed on the HIC and counted in Continuum homeless estimates is currently unknown.

In addition, many individuals who are survivors of recent domestic violence enter Emergency or Transitional shelters not specifically designated as DV shelters. The issue of domestic violence plays a significant role in persons experiencing new and often initial bouts of homelessness. While the vast majority of the households affected are single women or women with children, males may also report domestic violence as a primary reason for homelessness.

The federal mandate for reporting to Homeless Management Information System is currently waived for DV shelters due to concerns of security of the information and general confidentiality issues. Most, but not all, domestic violence do not enter data into their local HMIS. While the risk of release of this data to potential offenders is thought to be negligible, the concern for any release has supported the exclusion of HMIS reporting. Data are currently unavailable on the extent to which are DV shelters are entering HMIS data. Some facilities enter information anonymously or after the period of stay.

Many domestic violence transitional facilities also currently receive funding through the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance grants as prioritized within their Continuum. The recent evolution of using McKinney Vento funds only for Permanent Housing or Rapid ReHousing projects appears to put this money at risk in this year's funding application and years to come. A complete review of funding is not available on the extent of funds supporting DV shelters under McKinney-Vento.

The importance of DV facilities and their inclusion within the Continuum's Housing Inventory gives cause to shed light on this subset of homeless housing. This report will present data on the number of DV beds in each of the 400+Continuums and discuss additional data that may need to be collected to increase understanding in this critical area. Data are also presented on a state-by-state level with population prevalence rates.

Data and Limitations:

Data on Domestic Violence beds are taken from Continuum Housing Inventory Chart (HIC) data submitted with the annual McKinney-Vento Funding application. The HUD Exchange website provides a summarized list of HIC data for each of the Continuums. While the data does not list the number of DV beds in each Continuum, the HIC summary lists the total number of beds and the total number of non-DV beds. Simple calculations were performed to produce the total of DV beds, as well as the total DV

beds listed under both emergency and transitional housing. Small discrepancies were found in the HUD Exchange data with the individual total of emergency, transitional, safe haven beds falling short by 105 beds of the total DV bed counts. These discrepancies only impact the segregated totals for emergency and transitional beds which is not critical to the findings presented.

The extent to which the DV beds comprise the total number of DV facilities available in the country is unknown. Based on information from the National Network to End Domestic Violence (NNEVDV) 2014 Domestic Violence Counts report, it would appear that while not all DV shelters are included within the HICs, the majority seem to be included.

Analysis and Findings:

The total number of DV beds listed on Continuum HICs total 50,562 beds including 34,270 emergency beds and 16,187 transitional housing beds. DV beds represent 11.9 percent of the 426,267 total homeless beds. At the individual Continuum level, the number of DV beds as a percentage of total homeless beds ranges from 100 percent (3 Continuums) to 0 percent (16 Continuums). In addition, a total of 23 Continuums did not report any emergency DV beds while 162 Continuums listed no transitional DV beds. The New York City Continuum (NY-600) reported the largest total number of DV beds with 2,760 total DV beds including 2,099 emergency and 666 transitional representing 3.7 percent of all homeless beds. Continuums with high percentages of DV beds tended to be more rural areas or other areas where the number of non-DV homeless beds is lower, thus, producing a higher DV bed rate. Table 1 attached to this report provides a full listing of the DV rate for each Continuum.

An analysis at the State level showed a wide variation in prevalence with DV beds accounting for as low as 3.4 percent of total homeless beds in Hawaii to a high of 35.8 percent in New Mexico. Since the DV rate is impacted by the need for homeless beds and domestic violence tends to be more uniform in prevalence than homelessness across both urban and rural (low-density population) areas, the report calculated the rate of both total homeless and DV beds based on the state population, presented as a rate per 100,000 population. Using 2015 population census data, the total homeless bed rate per 100,000 was 131 beds with the DV-only bed rate of 16 per 100,000. DV beds rate at the state level ranged from 59 per 100,000 (Alaska and DC) to 8 per 100,000 (Maryland, Delaware). Total homeless bed rates range from 1,036 (DC) with a low of 50 (Mississippi). Table 2 contains the rates for each of the U.S. States and Territories.

Discussion:

Our analysis of the prevalence of DV beds among the total homeless bed inventory revealed several trends: 1) Large number of total beds (50,562), 2) Significant variation in the prevalence of DV beds as percentage of total homeless beds at both the Continuum and State level, and 3) Significant variation in the rate of DV beds per 100,000 population at the State level.

Continuums reporting low percentages of DV beds may reflect a number of issues: 1) General errors in the HIC, 2) Continuum practice of not including DV beds within their HICs or local DV non-participation in the Continuum, 3) Significant supply and demand issues with the provision of domestic violence services in the Continuum area. While rates of homelessness are known to fluctuate based on characteristics such as percentage of two adults families, urban/rural differences, race/ethnicity composition, rates of domestic violence and the need for shelter services are thought to have less variation across communities. Some communities, however, such as Native American communities in

Alaska are documented as having significant higher levels of domestic violence and the need for emergency shelter for survivors.

Data for the 2014 NNEDV study reported a one-day utilization of 36,606 beds including 23,856 emergency beds and 12,752 transitional housing beds. This compares with the 50,562 DV beds reported on the HIC Continuum charts (34,270 emergency and 16,178 transitional). The NNEDV study reported a response rate of 89 percent of all domestic violence programs (both residential and non-residential). The degree to which Continuums capture all residential DV programs in their communities is unknown. The fact that 23 communities listed no DV programs on their HIC and the known errors that continue to occur with HIC, it is also likely that the HIC count of 50,562 is also an undercount.

Using the HIC and NNEDV numbers, an estimated utilization can be calculated as approximately 72.4 percent (36,606 divided by 50,562) with a rate of 69.6 for emergency beds and 78.8 for transitional beds. Given the likely missing number of DV beds listed on HIC, the differences in the methodology of the HIC and NNEDV beds counts, this utilization number should only be used as an exploratory step in further research on the prevalence and utilization of DV beds in the homeless service system. In addition, family bed areas may often be under or over-utilized as a function of the reported bed number due to the size of the families (e.g. two person family using a room with three beds or 6 person family using a room with 4 beds).

This NHIP study presents an initial exploration in the prevalence and variation in DV beds at the Continuum and State level. The data presented reveals important areas that need additional investigation. If DV beds are considered homeless, it is important that all Continuums accurately report all of their DV program beds. Better data can also aid in identifying areas underserved by DV programs. The study also presents opportunities with merging data with the NNEDV bi-annual reports to provide more information about DV bed capacity and utilization.

Recommendation:

Based on the findings from this study, the NHIP would strongly recommend the following:

- 1) HUD Point-in-Time data should report separately the count of persons in DV shelters. This annual number can aid in providing support to the NNEDV effort as well as informing the public about this important homeless subpopulation.
- 2) Continuums that report no DV beds should be asked to review more closely their HIC charts to ensure that inclusion of the beds in the area are included – both in the HIC and the PIT.
- 3) Additional research is needed on the number of programs, beds and amount of funding currently received by DV programs that may be subject to de-prioritization by the changes in McKinney-Vento homeless assistance funding and the resulting community impact.

Due to the general non-participation of DV shelters in the HMIS process, it is currently not possible to better understand the degree to which DV shelter users enter the more formal homeless shelter system either directly through referral to a general emergency or transitional shelter or at a later time period after the initial entry and exit into the DV shelter. The NHIP would recommend a study at selected Continuums to better understand these utilization patterns. The degree to which DV beds are a feeder for other homeless housing programs is important to understand in order to reduce the total number of persons experiencing homelessness and especially persons who experience long-term homelessness.
