
# SAN FRANCISCO 2017 HOMELESS POINT-IN-TIME COUNT AND SURVEY



Every two years, during the last 10 days of January, communities across the country conduct comprehensive counts of the local homeless populations in order to measure the prevalence of homelessness in each local Continuum of Care.


The 2017 City and County of San Francisco Point-in-Time Count was a community-wide effort conducted on January 26, 2017. The entire county was canvassed by teams of volunteers. In the weeks following the street count, a survey was administered to 1,104 unsheltered and sheltered homeless individuals, in order to profile their experience and characteristics.

# **2017 Homeless Count Population**




# 2017 Sheltered/Unsheltered Population





# Disabling **Conditions**

Respondents reported the number of condtions that limited their ability to maintain work or housing. Many reported multiple conditions.

53% of survey respondents reported having one disabling condition.

# \*Subpopulation Definitions

#### **Chronically Homeless**

An individual with one or more disabling conditions or a family with a head of household with a disabling condition

- Has been continuously homeless for 1 year or more and/or;
- Has experienced 4 or more episodes of homelessness within the past 3 years.

#### **Veterans**

Persons who have served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States. This does not include inactive military reserves or the National Guard unless the person was called up to active duty.

#### **Families**

A household with at least one adult member (persons 18 or older) member (persons under

### **Unaccompanied Children** & Youth

Children under the age of 18 and young adults between the ages of 18 and 24 years old who are homeless and living without a parent or legal guardian.
